

Eligible Recipients: Any fulltime, part-time, or volunteer parks and recreation practitioner who has shown outstanding dedication to the field and has directly impacted the local community.

Nominee criteria:

- 1. Demonstrated community leadership qualities.
- 2. Involvement in innovative parks and recreation initiatives.
- 3. Contributions to system improvements in recreation and parks.
- 4. Outstanding, long-term impacts to the local community.



Nominations are submitted via online form, along with a short video or slides highlighting the nominee's efforts and achievements. Candidates may be self-nominated.



PROCLAMATION

PARK AND RECREATION PROFESSIONALS DAY July 19, 2019

WHEREAS, Pennsylvania is blessed with a rich variety of public lands that includes more than 6,000 community parks, 121 state parks, 18 national parks, 2.2 million acres of forest, wildlife refuges, natural streams and wetlands, nature centers, gardens, beaches, trails, campsites, athletic fields, visitors' centers, and many other recreation facilities that individually and collectively represent irreplaceable local, state, and national resources; and

WHEREAS, public lands throughout the commonwealth provide locally accessible natural and cultural resources for environmental learning, wildlife appreciation, and recreation, and promote civic ideals that include shared stewardship, recognition of public ownership, and civic engagement; and

WHEREAS, community-based recreation, education, and conservation programs positively impact local communities. Recreation opportunities offered by park and recreation professionals engage communities, help families and individuals lead an active lifestyle, and provide valuable educational enrichment opportunities; and

WHEREAS, our parks and recreation facilities are preserved, maintained, and improved by park and recreation professionals whose work is vital to the use and enjoyment of public lands. Park and recreation professionals include programmers, managers, maintainers, landscapers, facilitators, lifeguards, coaches, event organizers, caretakers, and many others who provide high-quality recreational and educational programming and ensure that our parks and recreation facilities are safe, clean, and ready to use; and

WHEREAS, all citizens are encouraged to explore, learn, be inspired by, and enjoy the great outdoors throughout the year in local, state, and national parks, and to show their appreciation to the park and recreation professionals who support all of us in our enjoyment of public spaces.

THEREFORE, in recognition of their hard and vital work, I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby proclaim July 19, 2019 PARK AND RECREATION PROFESSIONALS DAY, and I encourage all Pennsylvanians to show gratitude and appreciation to the professionals who help us to enjoy public lands.

WHEREAS, the park and recreation industry is a diverse and comprehensive system that improves personal, social, environmental, and economic health; and



PA House and Senate recognizes July 19 as Park and Recreation Professionals Day

House Resolution No. 370 Senate Resolution No. 148

The Pennsylvania House and the Pennsylvania Senate on Tuesday each passed resolutions designating and celebrating July 19 as Pennsylvania Park and Recreation Professionals Day in the Commonwealth. Pennsylvania Recreation and Park Society (PRPS) was pleased to work on these resolutions with the four co-chairs of the recently formed Parks and Recreation Caucus in the General Assembly. Senator Tom Killion, R-Delaware, and Senator Judy Schwank, D-Berks, sponsored Senate Resolution 148. On the House side, Representative R. Lee James, R-Venango, and Representative Robert Freeman, D-Northampton, sponsored House Resolution 370. Both resolutions were unanimously approved.

Recognizing and celebrating July 19, 2019, as "Pennsylvania Park and Recreation Professionals Day."

WHEREAS, This Commonwealth is home to 121 State parks, more than 6,000 local parks, various Federal parks and recreation facilities and numerous playgrounds, pools, beaches, campsites, marinas, picnic areas, athletic fields, skate parks, dog parks, festival venues, gardens, visitor centers, historic and cultural attractions and many other recreational facilities and amenities; and

*WHEREAS, The value and relative importance that Pennsylvanians place on State parks is demonstrated by the fact that while Pennsylvania is the 33rd largest state, only Alaska and California have more state park land; and

WHEREAS, United States Census Bureau data confirms that there are nearly 8,000 full-time and parttime park and recreation employees working in this Commonwealth; and

WHEREAS, Park and recreation professionals, complemented by thousands of volunteers who serve on boards, committees, trails, friends and neighborhood groups, contribute significantly to the health, well-being, economic vitality and quality of life of citizens of this Commonwealth of all ages; and

WHEREAS, Park and recreation professionals bring life-enriching services to citizens of all ages and abilities, work to keep facilities clean, safe and ready to use, strengthen community cohesion and resiliency, connect people with nature and each other, develop and manage a wide range of public programming and provide and promote opportunities for healthy living, social equity and environmental sustainability; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the House [and Senate] of Representatives recognize and celebrate July 19, 2019, as "Pennsylvania Park and Recreation Professionals Day" in this Commonwealth and extend its thanks and gratitude to park and recreation professionals and the essential services that they provide to our citizens and our communities.
