AGENCY OF THE YEAR AWARD Butler County Parks & Recreation Agency Director: Lance Welliver, Parks & Recreation Director

Butler County Parks & Recreation is the 2025 PRPS Agency of the Year for its exceptional contributions to enhancing the quality of life for its community through diverse and outstanding facilities, services, and programs.

Highlights of the department's accomplishments in the past five years include the rehabilitation of an ADA playground, a stream restoration in partnership with the PA Fish and Boat Commission, a complete overhaul of an existing waterpark, a historic Carousal restoration, full ADA accessibility at Alameda Park, enhanced mountain biking trails, and the construction of two new pavilions—one of which honors community First Responders. The department offers multiple sports, including flag football, softball, volleyball, paddleboarding, and yoga. The department also provides a 2+ acre dog park, which has become a regional destination. Finally, the department's special events, including holiday events, Community Days, and significant sporting events such as the Canadian-American Games, attract thousands yearly. In addition to its programming and parks, the department supports 57 municipalities in Butler County through its Local Park Renovation Grant Program. It has received over \$4 million in grants to enhance its parks and facilities.

Through strategic facility improvements, innovative programming, successful partnerships, and a commitment to community engagement, Butler County Parks & Recreation has achieved a significant distinction in Pennsylvania. They continue to provide high-quality recreation services that enrich the lives of their residents, foster community connections, and promote health and wellness across Butler County.

- Information and applications are available beginning in the summer on the PRPS website, by contacting the Recognition and Awards Chair, or the PRPS office. Those interested submit their entries electronically in January.
- Each member of the Recognition and Awards Committee receives an electronic copy of the nomination form for their review and evaluation against established criteria.
- Committee members vote anonymously and **do not vote** on their own agency submissions.
- The Agency of the Year Award is judged by an independent panel of experts in the field of parks and recreation.

The local community uses the trail for recreational walks with wellness benefits while relaxing in a natural setting populated with bluebirds and wildlife.

GREEN AND SUSTAINABLE PARK AWARD Camp Hill Borough

Siebert Park

Agency Director: Audrey Logar, CPRP, Recreation Director The enhancements to Siebert Park in Camp Hill Borough began as a stream restoration project designed to improve watershed health by reducing sediment in Blackberry Spring Run as part of the borough's MS4 pollutant reduction plan. The stream flows into Conodoguinet Creek, a popular spot for canoeing and kayaking and is adjacent to a popular trail and community park located across the street from a local elementary school. It is a valuable location for recreation and environmental education. Recognizing the importance of the stream and trail to the community, Camp Hill expanded the stream project to include three enhancement components - reduction of water pollution, improvement of the multi-use trail, and the construction of a formal kayak launch to benefit the environment and community. In addition to the kayak launch and trail improvements, the project also included designing safe access points for children to have hands-on experience in the stream, installing pedestrian connections to the park, and installing educational signage donated by a local non-profit.
